Midnight on Capitol Hill

Funding the War Machine:

Capitol Hill has been gradually plunged into chaos for the past month, but one would be forgiven for not noticing. As war erupts in the Middle East, government bureaucracy is on full display. Republicans and Democrats are now on the hook for funding yet another war, yet neither party can seem to reach a consensus on any kind of resolution for either the war in Ukraine or Israel's war in Gaza. The Biden administration recently requested 106 billion dollars to Congress to allocate funds for Ukraine, Israel, Taiwan, and border security domestically. Another 425 million dollar aid package announced by the Biden administration Friday has fueled discord over funding for the war in Ukraine within the Republican party. The unprecedented \$106 billion request remains stalled in the House due to objections from many House Republicans over continued support for the war in Ukraine. Many House Republicans additionally object to the consolidation of funding for both Ukraine and Israel into one bill. President Biden has made it clear he plans to veto any bill that provides aid to Israel, or Gaza for that matter if it does not also include aid for Ukraine. The Biden administration is doing this to ensure that aid to Ukraine continues, despite the objections of many Republicans in Congress.

Washington is struggling to manage the ballooning responsibilities it has taken on globally in recent years, particularly in the past few months. The war in Ukraine has reached a stalemate, with little progress made by either side. The Biden administration, to the objections of Ukrainian President Zelensky, has now shifted its priority to getting both sides to engage in peace talks and reach a ceasefire agreement. The aims of the U.S. government in Ukraine has been drastically reduced for the past year and this new messaging from the White House is a far cry from the administration's messaging regarding the war just months ago.

Israel's war in Gaza has also placed a great deal on an already fractured government. Washington was not ready for war in Israel, and now a decades-long U.S. policy of unequivocal support for Israel is on the line. Republicans in Congress, recent critics of continued support for the war in Ukraine, are now calling for more money and aid to be sent to Israel. Meanwhile, the Democrats who have been longtime supporters of supplying aid to Ukraine, are more hesitant as their party faces internal strife over the support for Israel. However, debates over American support for Israel have not remained contained to Congress. American cities and families have been divided with calls for a ceasefire amid growing unrest and tension in many communities.

Where do we go next?

Congress is stuck in a deadlock regarding each of these conflicts, one of which continues to escalate as U.S. forces come under fire by Iranian-backed militias in Iraq. These two conflicts aren't the only headache for Capitol Hill. The House has been embroiled in a weekslong speaker battle after Matt Gaetz (R-FL), had successfully passed a motion to vacate the former speaker, Kevin McCarthy. The House finally chose a new speaker, Republican Mike Johnson from Louisiana, an unfamiliar name. Johnson has been an advocate for aid to Israel and a critic of any continued aid to Ukraine. While the House remains in a fragile state as it fails to meet its deadlines, another one is approaching, and quickly. Two months ago the 45-day emergency funding resolution was passed by then speaker of the House. Kevin McCarthy, merely hours before the government was set to shut down. Yet another funding deadline has passed with no concrete resolution. The federal government has yet again kicked the can down the road, setting the stage for two more funding fights in January and February. Axios reported that some lawmakers have even suggested "punting" the budget debate as far away as April to give the House more time to address its long list of problems, like the conflicts in the Ukraine and Israel.

The government repeatedly approaches and fails to meet its budget deadlines and almost no progress on a finalized bill has been made in months. Congress isn't the only part of our government in turmoil. The Department of Defense is struggling to deal with escalating global tensions and the DOJ is struggling to manage many high-profile cases, specifically those connected to former President Donald Trump. Besides a brief address to the nation by President Biden, the White House has been relatively silent on government funding and the escalating situation in the Middle East. The Biden administration has no definitive foreign policy plan for the Middle East and likely does not know how to respond if attacks on U.S. forces continue, or if Iran directly involves themselves in the war.

Outlook for 2024:

The U.S. government is struggling to do its job and reach any coherent plan or consensus on key issues. Every single government agency is stressed, overwhelmed, plagued by political strife, and exacerbated by intense government bureaucracy. The 2024 general election is in less than a year from now and as the government struggles on every front, the presidential race begins to heat up. Each presidential election grows more contentious and taxing than the last. As the government struggles to manage its responsibilities now, is it ready to handle the stress of an election year?

Upcoming Meteor Showers

Don't worry about telescopes or star charts: all you need are clear, dark skies and a little bit of patience. December has one of the most stunning meteor showers of the year, and we're lucky enough to have the beach to watch it from. The best view is from Jones Beach, but Long Beach is great too! If you find yourself enamored of the stars, consider downloading an app to see the constellations. Get to know your sky a little better. It's easier than you think!

December 13th - 14th: Geminids

With up to 150 multicolored meteors visible per hour at its peak, the Geminid shower always promises a show worth staying up for. It's most active from after sunset on the 13th to the early morning of the 14th around the Gemini constellation (rising from the east), plus the new moon will keep the skies dark!

December 22nd - 23rd: Ursids

This meteor shower is the least active with 5 to 10 visible meteors at its peak, but it follows the longest discovered comet of the three mentioned: comet Tuttle, found in 1790. They'll radiate from Ursa Minor, or the little dipper (rises from the north) if you can spot a few sparks amidst the light of the unfortunately bright waxing gibbous moon.

January 3rd - 4th: Quadrantids

This meteor shower is born of the dust of an extinct comet and watchers can see up to 40 shooting stars per hour. This shower will be most active around the Bootes constellation but can be seen anywhere in the sky.

December 4th: Look for Mercury!

On the night of December 4th, Mercury will be at greatest eastern elongation from the Sun, which just means it'll be setting as far east of the sun as it can. Mercury will be more visible than usual because it's farther from the sun's glare, so look southwest after the sunset to catch Mercury's descent.

January 12th: Look for Mercury Again!

The greatest western elongation of Mercury is basically the opposite of the eastern elongation: it is as far west from the Sun as it can get, and it's visible before the sunrise instead of after the sunset. Look to the skies on your way to school to see Mercury!



Reading Culture with Dr. Radice

Dr. Lorraine Radice is our director of literacy for Long Beach Public Schools and has published the book, Leading a Culture of Reading: How to Ignite and Sustain a Love of Literacy in Your School Community. This book provides educators with tools and ideas on how to make reading a more integral part of the school curriculum. In this interview, she takes us through the aspects of her book, her inspiration, her goals when writing, and some of her favorite kinds of books to read!

Q. Could you tell us a little about your book?

A. The book is about how to build engagement in learning and each chapter is dedicated to how a group of people can help inspire kids to be interested in reading and to find their reading identity. So for example, the first chapter is about creating a reading campaign, like we have LB Reads. Media is something that you can use to help you launch and it spreads a message about the importance of reading so that all people can join in. There is also a chapter about how adults can be reading role models, about how students can be leaders of reading. So it's really about how we bring communities together in schools to prioritize reading and celebrate it and emphasize how important it is for adults and kids to practice!

Q. How would you define Brand Reading?

A. The first chapter is called Brand Reading and that is all about how-- You know how companies create slogans, hashtags, they have symbols as visuals: like Nike with *Just Do It?* You can do the same thing for reading. So, #LBReads is our *Just Do It.* Our visual for #LBReads is a sandcastle. If you create a brand and image around reading, it is something for people to refer to and that becomes a source of energy to build a reading community around that campaign. That is part of the brand of our district: prioritizing reading.

Q. What inspired you to write this book?

A. My love for the topic. I love to work with teachers and educators, that is my passion; it's my favorite part of my job. I really really believe in the importance of reading and I believe that all kids and all adults are different when it comes to reading. It is a priority for educators to make sure that we connect with all different types of readers in a school.

Q. Was there a key moment in your career that led you to write about this topic?

A. Yeah, I think it was during my interview for this job when Dr. Gallagher said to me: "Do you have any ideas about how we can build a culture of reading?" That was really important to her as a superintendent and that was a turning point for me because I was so happy that that was a priority for her and the district. I took my experience in the classroom as a middle school English teacher and thought about how I was a leader of kids and helped them build their reading lives in my classroom. I wanted to share that with other people and draw inspiration from my experiences, as well as learn from other teachers in our district and share what they do.

Q. If you were to describe your book in five words, what would those words be?

A. Practical, relatable, engaging, inspiring, attainable.

O. What is your favorite book or author?

A. Ooo, I love rom-coms. I love rom-com movies and books. I love Emily Henry's books.

Emily: I love Emily Henry too! Beach Read!

A. Beach Read and Happy Place, I read over the summer and The People We Meet on Vacation like I will just sail through those books. I just love her style as an author. I think she's hilarious and I think she writes banter between characters really well. I just finished Lessons in Chemistry which was more of a development of a character and a story. It's actually going to be on AppleTV. I love the connection between movies, TV, and books. Reading is a bit of an escape for me which is why I like romantic comedy.

Q. Which chapter of your book was the easiest to write? The hardest?

A. The hardest was the introduction, actually. So I wrote the whole book before I wrote the introduction. It was so hard for me to capture the essence of what the book was about that I called my colleague and I said to her "Can you just tell me a little about what I do?!" I could write the details of the chapters but I couldn't tie it all together with a nice bow. I needed to know what impact the work has on other people in order for me to introduce my book in a way that ties it all together. The easiest part of the book was probably the second chapter about teachers being role models. I talk to teachers about that all the time. I taught classes about that and I have a lot of resources for that. That was probably the easiest chapter to think about. But really, the book was not very challenging because it is an account of what I do every day with teams of people in Long Beach.

We want to thank Dr. Radice for sharing her new book with us! It was amazing to hear about the process as well as learn more about the philosophy that shapes our school curriculum!



DRINKS THAT WILL WARM YOUR HEART

Being a barista can be really helpful during the holiday season especially since going out to buy coffee can add up quickly. Plus, creating drinks at home can help create that cozy fall feeling while still being productive on those "cozy" days. Allowing yourself to be creative with your food and drinks can often help you get to know your likes and dislikes, while also getting in touch with your artistic and creative ability. Some of my personal favorites that I've created are Pumpkin Chai lattes, Cinnabon lattes, Apple Cinnamon Chai, and a festive Peppermint Marshmallow Mocha.

While all these drinks do have specific ingredients, most of these ingredients are commonly found in your house or local shopping mart. A lot of these recipes are especially simple to create because many ingredients are sold grounded/premade in bottles/cans. One of the most positive things about making your drinks is the access you get to try as much or as little of any ingredient as you want. So don't be shy and go crazy!

Pumpkin Chai: Pumpkin chai is a really simple drink that consists of concentrated chai (Oregon Chai is my personal favorite brand), McCormick pumpkin pie spice, a cinnamon stick, and your choice of milk. You also need a small pot to boil your ingredients in. Fill a little more than half of your cup with chai, the rest with milk (almond milk sits really well with these other elements because it's a smoother, lighter milk which really helps accentuate the other flavors), a tap or two on the back of the spice bottle into the cup. Once you add all this, add it to the pot and begin to boil it. While boiling take your cinnamon stick and swirl it around into your drink until it's boiled. Once it's the temperature you like, it's all done!

Apple Cinnamon Chai Latte: This is one of my personal favorites because you get that fruity fall element along with the tea accents. This one includes apple juice, concentrated chai, grounded nutmeg powder (McCormick), and a cinnamon stick.

I would recommend using apple juice with a more subtle taste so it balances out. Once that is in your cup, boil it over the stove. Once it's boiling, tap the nutmeg powder once or twice and you keep the same pattern of mixing it with the cinnamon stick until you're satisfied with the temperature.

(continued from previous page) Now getting into some of the more cozy winter drinks, we have the Cinnabon latte and a Peppermint Marshmallow Mocha.

Cinnabon Latte: This drink is perfect for that transition time from fall to winter. Personally, I like it better iced. It's super simple to make iced or hot. Take white chocolate syrup and drizzle it around your cup. Then you simply take your cold brew or hot coffee and pour it into your cup. Tap your powdered cinnamon a couple of times then top it off a little more drizzle and your choice of milk (a thicker milk tastes better).

Peppermint Marshmallow Mocha: A marshmallow mocha is a perfectly sweet and cozy drink for the start of the Christmas season. You need chocolate syrup, coffee, white chocolate syrup, and a candy cane (you can also purchase liquefied peppermint flavoring). Drizzle both chocolates into your cup and then add the coffee followed by a little more of the drizzle. Take your peppermint flavoring or candy cane and add it to mix it. If you wanna get really fancy and creative you can add little marshmallows at the end!





BOOK REVIEW: A THOUSAND SPLENDID SUNS

Whenever I am asked for a book recommendation from a friend or a stranger, I can only think of one book worth sharing. No matter the genre or theme they seek, I'll always recommend *A Thousand Splendid Suns* by Khaled Hosseini. I had first heard about it through BookTok, a platform that I am both reliant on and apprehensive of.

One post might be a summarization of The Secret History in perfect detail with enlightening anecdotes, while the next post could be someone giving Colleen Hoover 5 stars. To say the least, I take everything I find there with a grain of salt. But I digress; I downloaded an ePub of A Thousand Splendid Suns and settled in.

To summarize, Mariam is a young Afghan girl living on the outskirts of town with her mother. Her father, a wealthy businessman, visits her every month but does not claim her as his child. On her birthday, she waits for her father to retrieve her, but he never arrives; she goes into town on her own (against her mother's wishes) and finds his house. After sleeping in his front yard, Mariam sneaks through the house's gates; he sees her through a window, shuts the blinds, and Mariam is escorted away. Feeling rejected and idiotic, Mariam returns home to apologize to her mother but never gets the chance.

After this, Mariam is married to a man more than twice her age and is put on a path of torment and pain. Only when she meets Laila, her husband's younger second wife, does an escape from their nightmare come into view.

A Thousand Splendid Suns is a tribute to Hosseini's upbringing in Afghanistan, much like his first work, The Kite Runner. His skillful storytelling allows readers to feel moments of sadness and triumph along with the characters, leaving them desperate to turn the page and read more. The book not only delves into the oppressive rule of the ever-present Taliban but also the trials and tribulations that women face every day when met with society's standards of modesty and honor. A Thousand Splendid Suns perfectly captures the resilience of the human spirit and the enduring power of hope, marking the book as an exceptional literary masterpiece.

Dr. Natali has said that from her experience of having daughters, she knows, "Kids grow out their clothes before they are really worn." Putting two and two together they decided to look at, "having gently worn clothes donated, that other students can have."

Is this your first time starting/planning something like this?

The act of donating old clothes is not something Dr. Natali is unfamiliar with: "I usually donate my children's clothes to St. Marys in hope that they get into the hands of those who need it."

The committee had wanted to try to have an actual space for donations to come in and out, but space has been an issue. "That is when we came up with the idea of a "pop-up," she explained. "We put together a small pilot of the pop-up concept last June one Saturday at the Arts in the Plaza."

The pop-up idea was an original and creative way of working around the issue of space.

What would you say was the biggest challenge with the Boutique?

As Dr. Natali mentioned before the biggest issue would have to be space. "We don't have the space to house the clothes. Luckily, we were able to work with Mr. Epstein to use the gym for our collections and storage."

Dr. Natali also mentioned that volunteers can also be an issue at times but, "partnering with the High School and Middle School clubs can help to solve that. This year Lauren Clune took on the boutique initiative as her NHS officer's project." Dr. Natali hopes that they will always have a student to help run the program for years to come.




